CBOQ UPDATE

Taking the temperature of our church

The second in a series where I will discuss fifteen questions proposed by the Canadian Baptists of Ontario & Quebec (CBOQ) in the topic 'Taking the temperature of your church', part of the series Revitalizing Small Churches.

Two (2) more questions that the Deacons' Board discussed at the June meeting, as follows:



- 1. Most of the members in my church are in Bible study or small home groups.
- 2. My church does a good job of discipling members

Both statements are related. Let me explain this further.

"Discipling" is the act of making disciples. To understand what a disciple is, I use this quote from Wikipedia: "In Christianity, disciple primarily refers to a dedicated follower of Jesus. This term is found in the New Testament only in the Gospels and Acts. In the ancient world, a disciple is a follower or adherent of a teacher. It is not the same as being a student in the modern sense. A disciple in the ancient biblical world actively imitated both the life and teaching of the master. It was a deliberate apprenticeship which made the fully formed disciple a living copy of the master." It is important to distinguish between "disciples" and "apostles". Whereas the apostles were disciples, there were only twelve apostles. The apostles were given authority by Jesus and sent out to preach the Gospel.

In today's church, we aspire to teach and train disciples. Through Bible study, small home groups, and sermons we want our members to be more Christ like. This is a process that does not end, until we meet our heavenly reward. Our more mature disciples take on positions as teachers, preachers, and leaders for the flock.

You are familiar with John 3:16, an often-quoted scripture but are you familiar with Revelations 3:16? starting with verse 15 "I know your deeds, that you are neither cold nor hot. I wish you were either one or the other! 16 So, because you are lukewarm – neither hot nor cold – I am about to spit you out of my mouth." This scripture causes me to reflect on my spiritual walk.

Where are you at in discipling? Are you open to Bible study? Does the prospect of small home groups interest you? Do you have a desire to be more Christ like? Do you wish to please God?


UBC Young Adults - *Unique, Bold, and Creative!*

On Saturday, May 29, 2021, the <u>Northern Association of Baptist Churches</u> again held the **Spring Assembly and AGM via Zoom.** This would mark the second year in a row that the COVID-19 pandemic has kept this assembly from congregating at The United Baptist Church.

Following the 9:30 am welcome, praise and worship, attendees had the opportunity to choose between three (3) breakout rooms. I want to share with

you the breakout room that I chose – <u>Room 1: Technology</u> – What options do we have and how do they work? This session was facilitated by <u>Peter Panabaker</u> and <u>Kevin James</u>. It was described as guiding participants in a tour of various technologies that churches are utilizing in their various ministries.

In reality, the +/- 8 participants, plus 2 facilitators, were asked in turn to describe what their church was doing. I listened as several talked about using Zoom, some recorded the service ahead, to upload to YouTube. One church (or more) has just recorded the sermon for upload to YouTube. I believe that there was one church that struggled through the pandemic and did not have worship services when in-person were not allowed. A couple expressed that they were searching for a camera and would appreciate help. When it was my turn, I explained that we utilized Zoom, and have since March 2020, never missing a worship service. I talked about how this year we began recording the service for upload to YouTube, as well. I explained that at times, when restriction relaxed, we have had in-person attendance, zoom attendance, and some that watch on YouTube at their convenience, especially if work prevented them from in-person or Zoom.

When I got to the subject of **cameras**, I said that most important is to determine what your budget is. At The United Baptist Church, **we have been blessed with two (2) grants from CBOQ for our audio-video**, **plus private donations towards this as well.** When I said that UBC **have spent almost \$13,000.00** on our audio-visual in phase one, including a PTZ Optics camera (editorial note — this is a pan, tilt and zoom camera that is operated remotely) and a **BlackMagic Pocket Cinema camera** a *few mouths dropped open*. Upon hearing this, co-facilitator Kevin James stated, "I only wish that our church could have a BlackMagic Pocket Cinema camera".

Aside from All Nations Church in Sudbury, who are broadcasting the service on KFM and, I believe live streaming, we may be the most advanced church within the Northern Association of Baptist Churches. Roger Johns and I have been very invested in putting together the "new" audio-visual and we hope that it bears fruit and performs in a manner that will transform our worship service for those not attending in person. Phase two will be to add a second PTZ camera, and a new amplifier, which may come as early as this summer. Phase 3 is planned to have a recording "studio" primarily for soloists and instrumentalists to see themselves performing in front of the camera, or for recorded messages for worship or other needs and even as an aid for our church members who have a need for recording a message. Sunday June 20th, we recorded our first trial of a worship service. This is an important step to get the bugs out, fine tune the production and have a good feel for the equipment. This will continue for 2 or 3 more worship services before we go live

We give thanks to God for blessing us with the technology and equipment to reach outside the walls of The United Baptist Church.
